Remembering Robert N. "Bob" Hubbach (1938-2022) 25 May 2022

Judi and I met Bob Hubbach in April 1976 at our first Paint Creek Folk Gathering meeting at the Rochester home of PCFG Co-founder John Carter and his wife. When we arrived, John and Bob were conducting a detailed examination of a hammered dulcimer on John's workbench in the basement. Bob had brought it back from a recent east coast folk festival. John played guitar and sang during the meeting while Bob played 5-string banjo and dulcimer. Bob was 37 years old at the time. We would share monthly Paint Creek meetings with Bob as we rotated gatherings in member's homes during the early years. We enjoyed the company of both him and his wife Irene. In addition to being a fine musician, he could recite Jonathan Winters comedy routines from Winters' LP record albums. Some of his favorite recitations were "Oldest Airline Stewardess - Maude Frickert" and "Moby Dick & Capt. Arnold". He was an accomplished musician and particularly enjoyed playing old British Isles and Early American jigs and reels on the dulcimer, and old-timey southern tunes on the banjo. Bob and John were both members in good standing of Paint Creek Folk Gathering/Paint Creek Folklore Society at the time of the adoption of the first charter of Paint Creek Folklore Society on April 2, 1977. The two of them were one of the four acts of Paint Creek's first Tin Whistle Coffeehouse on June 19, 1977, at the Oakland Center Abstention in Oakland University. Bob's first "group" was called Buffalo Nickel and consisted of Bob on dulcimer, John Carter on guitar and Al Smitley on fiddle. One of their earliest gigs was the second Paint Creek Picnic at Rosemary Kornacki's house in Troy, on August 14, 1977. The workshop for the picnic was Clog & Contra Dancing, led by Paul Tyler.

As we got to know Bob better in the early years of PCFS, we learned that he was a gifted artist working primarily in watercolors. He was an automotive designer for Chrysler and had patents on a number of vehicle designs. He also painted landscapes, homes and nature scenes. Our first glimpse of this was his collection of watercolors of historical homes in Clarkston, Michigan, that he had been commissioned to paint in 1975 for the American Revolution Bicentennial in 1976. Clarkston put reduced copies of six of Bob's paintings on the front of note cards along with a description of the homes. They were sold in gift shops around town. Bob used these as late as August 29, 2019, in notes to friends. Other commissions that Bob was awarded through the years included painting the classic vehicles at Concourse d'Elegance car show at Meadowbrook Hall in Rochester Hills.

In September 1978, Bob joined with twelve other members of Paint Creek Folklore Society to form *The Olde Michigan Ruffwater Stringband*. He was one of two hammered dulcimers in the band and in short order we were very busy as the modern contra dance fever was just starting in Michigan and across the country. Judi Morningstar would swing from mandolin to hammered dulcimer, and William Webster joined the group to bring the dulcimer contingent to four. In May 1979, *Ruffwater* was selected as the house band for the Third Saturday Contra and Square dances held at St. Timothy Methodist Church at Archdale and Puritan in Detroit. Burton Schwartz from the Detroit Country

Dance Society was the caller. In November 1980, *Ruffwater* played for Paint Creek's *Tin Whistle Coffeeshouse #7* at Fellowship Hall in University Presbyterian Church, Rochester Hills. *Ruffwater* also performed at the monthly American Contra Dancing series at Lovett Hall in Greenfield Village from October 1981 until February 2005. Through the years Bob and Ruffwater performed from Ironwood, Michigan to Toronto, Ontario, to Berea, Kentucky to Chicago, Illinois, some 2000+ dances and concerts. In addition to a busy *Ruffwater* schedule, Bob was a traveling dance musician as well, joining in with bands from around Michigan for a one-night session. He also enjoyed his sojourns to the east coast where he joined with the likes of dance musician and caller Dudley Laufman. He also played as part of *Modesty Forbids*, a group with an Irish slant that played in the Clarkston area. In addition to recording *Michigan Winter*, *Michigan Spring* and *Michigan Summer* with *Ruffwater*, Bob produced two of his own CD's titled *UpNorth Down East* (2004) and *Out the Buckhorn Way* (2011). Bob's dear wife Irene passed away in November 2015. One of the last two dance weekends that Bob was a part of was the Be Happy Dance Weekend on Beaver Island, Michigan, August 16-18, 2019. *Uncle Lou & the Oakland County All Stars* played all the music for the Friday, Saturday and Sunday dance programs, Bob on dulcimer, Brad Battey Jr. on fiddle and Judi Morningstar on piano. His last weekend dance camp as musician was Michigan Dance Heritage Fall Dance Camp at Camp Cavell, Lexington, Michigan. September 20-22, 2019. Bob's legacy lives on with two wonderful daughters, Erica (Hubbach) Koerber and Sarah Hubbach, both living in Michigan.

There's a whole lot more to tell of this remarkable man. I hope I've provided the Keepin' Tabs readers with a good glimpse of Bob, his many talents, and a few of his contributions to Paint Creek Folklore Society.

Do you ever wish?

A few days ago, the sky was overcast and a light spring rain fell. The precipitation was cool enough to make you want to close the windows. The rain came on and off, inconsistent.

With a cup of coffee warming my hands, I walked across our back room and looked up the hill thinking I might catch a glimpse of Homer the Roamer, Tom-Tom or one of the other feral cats making their morning rounds. Instead, I was drawn into a vista.

My eyes fell on our eastern perennial bed. There, in the damps of early light, a carpet of creeping phlox tumbled over the aged timbers of our east perennial bed.

I suspect an artist might refer to that soft, pinkish-purple cloud as a *focal point*. A subject such as that requires a frame and from my vantage point, framing had already been established by three Japanese maple trees.

The foreground wet, verdant and lush, and although the background of burgeoning peony and daffodil directs your gaze above and beyond the phlox towards a mulberry tree of behemoth proportion, your focus will always return to the phlox.
