Covid Thoughts

Former Paint Creeker Vikki Appleton Fielden posted her thoughts and experiences of Covid on Facebook, and gave us permission to share it here.

Three years since our (and *everyone's*) lives changed...

With 20/20 hindsight, we now know [my husband] Iain definitely had Covid, and developed Long Covid -- from which he STILL has not entirely recovered. Three years later, he still has "brain fog", his memory is shot, he has joint and muscle aches, can't

stand for long periods of time, gets out of breath easily and I can hear the effort it costs him to go up/down a flight of stairs.

He has had Covid three times now, and each time ends up with fun new Long Covid symptoms.

The statistics I've seen say that your chances of getting Long Covid increase to 70% by the time you've had Covid three times. And the current thinking is that Covid is similar to AIDS in that they're finding it stays in your body and quietly does damage in the background (to organs, joints, muscles, etc).

Meanwhile, Iain's mum has almost completely lost her senses of smell and taste (she can taste salty and sweet, but that's pretty much it). We think she must have caught Covid (without other symptoms) a couple of months ago -- even though she and Dad don't go anywhere besides shopping and doctor appointments, and wear cloth masks...

The other day I went into a shop (wearing a proper respirator, not a cloth mask, as always), and an acquaintance who happened to be there immediately said, "You know, they've proved that masks don't do any good!"

I do a LOT of reading about Covid, and I know there was a big study that concluded masks don't work -- and I also know there were *huge* flaws in that study (like deciding that if you sometimes mask and sometimes don't, and get Covid, that "proves that masks don't work"). I can provide links, for anyone interested...

Anyway, I'll keep wearing my respirator, even though it feels a bit lonely at times, and avoiding restaurants and in-person singing sessions, even though I miss them like crazy -- but I think that in 10-20 years (maybe less), people will realise that most western governments didn't take Covid seriously enough, and that many millions of people who've had "mild" Covid a bunch of times will be struggling to deal with premature aging, and serious conditions including early dementia, heart damage, organ damage, debilitating joint and/or muscle pain, difficulty breathing, and more. It makes me sad... and angry.
