A good reason for plunking on a banjo is to level out your thinking. A process like that produces equanimity. Philosopher Brian Johnson says equanimity is one of the best words ever, coming from the Latin aequus (even) and animus (mind) which means a balanced mind.

Everyone, whether they know it or not, wishes for a balanced mind, but not everyone realizes that the secret to attaining and maintaining such a thing relies on owning and practicing the banjo. Intriguing tidbit: Pete Seeger once said that every child should receive a banjo at birth.
