Ridin' Drag

The thought occurred to me that, for as long as I have been writing these Ridin' Drag pieces, I never mentioned their relevance to December, Christmas, and friendship. May I correct that?

I'm a paper and pencil guy. These days I prefer a Blackwing 602 pencil, mostly for eraser function. My notebooks vary from Moleskines to foolscap or hard-covered journals I find at Costco.

The pencil and paper produce the first draft, and those first drafts can be rough. How rough? Read Anne LaMott's, <u>Bird by Bird</u>. Hence the eraser. Once things take shape, I transfer the piece onto the computer. The practice comes naturally, as pencil in hand,

the feel of a page creates, while the keyboard smooths the process of correction and revision.

Writers take note; afterward, I learned this was the practice of William Zinsser, author of On Writing Well. Both mediums have their place.

Speaking of places, where do you write? Some writing coaches insist you use the same spot, always. I have a desk with drawers and calendars and the accompanying clutter Mr. Zinsser refers to in Chapter Three. There is even a comfortable chair. This is where I perform email related tasks. If you see me in a Zoom meeting, that's the space.

But that space is rarely conducive to producing a Ridin' Drag, it's just too permanent. The sense of being stuck in one spot runs counter to the spirit of riding. So, I move about, and this is accomplished with a Christmas gift I received in 1992.

My friend Scott knew I was doing a powerful number of papers on my journey through seminary. One December afternoon he surveyed his shop, pulled down some scrap oak, drew a sketch, measured twice, cut once and at a Sunday evening service said, "Merry Christmas, Brother, stay strong."

He held out the portable desk that is on my lap now. Sometimes it holds a legal pad. At the moment, it supports a laptop.

Then he signed it Scott J. Taylor, December 1992, and added Ecclesiastes 12:13.

Every Ridin' Drag you read, I write on the desk Scott crafted. No Ridin' Drag is ever written in the same place twice. The desk is welcome in the garden, along the ridge and beyond. Which brings me to repairs.

Because you won't do much riding, sailing, or general living without fixing things. Like when your portable desk slips, wood splits, and hinges twist.

It's the same with folks, we slip too. And by grace, we mend.

Drill bits waiting, wood screws and glue at the ready, I'll attempt a restoration in the morning. My work won't measure up to Scott's, but might bring the uncommon maker a smile as he moves ahead of the herd, on point past the north star.

Yet still, nearby. Near enough to whisper, *Keep writing, be brave, stay strong and remain grateful for this turning of the season.*
