Together they stand like sentries, cooperating to provide shelter to both the little bird and the burning bush. It is the same promise we gave to our two cats. The oldest was found incarcerated in the Oakland County Animal shelter. I wish I had known him as a youngster because Beebo is a true gentleman who doesn't do anything wrong and is the handsomest cat in the world. But with a milky eye, his prospects for adoption were poor. Perhaps that is why he was at the shelter, or why we chose to shelter him.

The younger cat, a female with a tortoise shell coat, was discovered out of doors and out of options. When first sighted, she kept the company of ferals, but later, after great effort and expense, proved not to be so. She had been abandoned. Put out on the street. One day you are the family favorite, then you are not in the family at all.

The first kindness an abandoned cat may find is from ferals; free-rangers lacking human socialization, but tribal enough to accept a stranger into their fold. So, the newcomer follows, poaching and polishing manners from the example of more experienced feral felines. Manners, that at some back porches could earn a free meal - or -land you in a Trap-Neuter-Return program with your ear tipped.

After taking her in and naming her Grizzy Bear, we came to realize that her bravado was just the common nature of tortie cats. More fearful than fierce, Grizzy began to understand that her frightening misadventure was over and that snoozing in a cozy bed on a November night was so much nicer.

Friends, fate, life, and the weather can turn on you. Sometimes a place to shelter keeps body and soul from giving up.

# **Membership Highlights**

At our April gathering, we had 39 members and 24 guests, surging our attendance to 63 people, several of whom were friends of the presenters, and we were entertained by 17 song swap performers.

I want to thank our snack hosts Susan and Maggie for preparing enough snacks for such a large crowd. After February 29, our membership dues were reduced by half, so for \$25 each, two members joined in March, and one more joined in April, bringing our total membership to 78 members.

Remember to stop by the Membership table to pick up your name tag, sign in as a member or guest, and sign up for the song swap, which everyone is welcome to participate in. Bring your folklore loving friends, so that they can enjoy the presentation, learning, visiting, jamming, and snacks, as they meet and hang out with positive, young-at-heart folks.

#### On the Cover of the...CDSS News!

The cover of the 2024 Spring edition of CDSS News, the newsletter of the Country Dance and Song Society, displays an artifact that has its roots in the Paint Creek Folklore Society, an Affiliate Group of the CDSS. In the lower right-hand corner of the cover is a stylish 33-1/3 LP record album cover titled "MICHIGAN WINTER" by The Olde Michigan Ruffwater Stringband.

This album cover is part of a collage of albums for the promotion of an article in the newsletter titled "A Hand for the Band!" by David Millstone. New members in Paint Creek may not be familiar with the Ruffwater crew, so here are a few tidbits to acquaint you with them. Ruffwater was formed in September 1978 out of small group, and solo musicians and singers in Paint Creek.

The original group was thirteen strong, featuring four hammer dulcimers, three fiddles, two guitars, one banjo, one mandolin/accordion, one recorder/spoons/baritone and one bass. They formed as the contradancing craze and the demand for contra dance music was growing in Michigan, the Detroit Country Dance Society having been formed in 1977. Ruffwater was the house band for DCDS monthly contra and square dances beginning in May 1979 at St. Timothy Methodist Church in Detroit.

The band launched the Early American Contradancing series in Lovett Hall in Dearborn in October of 1981, the series running for 23-1/2 years. Ruffwater was the first of the Michigan bands to record contra dance music, with MICHIGAN WINTER being released in the Spring of 1981. MICHIGAN WINTER was recorded in Lawnridge Hall of the University Presbyterian Church complex in Rochester Hills, where monthly Paint Creek meetings were held until the 2018 Covid pandemic.

Since its inception, the band has grown to sixteen members and has released two more recordings, MICHIGAN SPRING and MICHIGAN SUMMER. Ruffwater also recorded dance instruction records for the Lloyd Shaw Foundation out of Colorado. Ruffwater has always been proud of their connection to Paint Creek, and through the fifty years in the history of Paint Creek, has provided six presidents, three vice-presidents, and two historians. Ruffwater members organized the Tin Whistle coffeehouse and launched the Keepin' Tabs Newsletter, the first four editors being from Ruffwater. Ruffwater has performed in three of the society's Tin Whistle Coffeehouses and has led numerous workshops at the monthly meetings. Six members of Ruffwater were heavily involved in the Michigan-Kentucky-Denmark Folk Music, Song and Dance exchanges organized by Paint Creek in 1984, 1985, 1987 and 1989, as leaders, home hosts and performers in Michigan and Denmark.

In more recent years, Ruffwater provided music and led dancing for 18th and 19th century reenactment groups and youth group cotillions around the State. In our 46th year, Ruffwater still performs for auspicious occasions and a few of our members still regularly provide dance music in Michigan. Ruffwater tips our hats to Paint Creek Folklore Society as Paint Creek celebrates their 50th year in 2024.
