Ridin' Drag

Ridin' Drag

For decades municipalities across the country have entertained and attempted to embrace the concept of urban farming. Up and down the boulevard folks are claiming their right to farm. The dream of converting your half-acre city lot into the next episode of Green Acres is rather romantic. And a lot of work.

Still, every turn of the season, someone is inspired to grow their own food, escape the greedy clutches of GMO Based, honeybee harming Big Ag, and live sustainably in the neighborhood. This requires city managers, council members and planning commissioners to create fair and equitable ordinances and code enforcement that benefit all involved. Which brings us to birds. Specifically, roosters.

Every urban farmer I know longs to rise of a cold frosty morning, slip into the hen house, and gently wrap their fingers around fresh laid eggs. Eggs with colors more appealing than the ones Fredrick Meijer markets. They might not be extra jumbo, but the flavor they impart will meld with your authentically grown ingredients to create an omelet Julia Child would flee Paris for.

I don't know if Julia kept chickens. But I do know that most municipalities willing to allow them, hold the rooster in low regard. Hens will be limited to five, give or take, provided their enclosure is properly built. Roosters? Nope. Why? The rooster is by all accounts an aggressive, noisy, cantankerous critter. I come by this knowledge firsthand. My mother enjoyed chickens and found roosters most colorful. And like always, mom was right, but...at four AM, in a dark horse barn, of a July morning, when her favorite rooster, Rojo, is spurring your ankles and pecking your calves, while you try to find the light switch...that's about all the scarlet and rust I can stand. Did I mention the noise?

I refer to an all-day long, incessant harangue of aviary man-splaining. Not the gentle reasonable puttering of hen-speak, nor the acceptable once or twice idyllic alarm at dawn portrayed in Saturday morning cartoons. No, it's not hard to understand how a barnyard dog could be tempted to take action into his own jaws.

So, you won't find roosters allowed within the city limits. But if you admire the flash of a rooster's comb and the varied hues, why not plant celosia cristada? That's the botanist's name for cockscomb. We enjoyed a bunch of them this year and are now in the process of gathering

seeds. Bumblebees love them. Butterflies too. When you're standing alongside them, you understand how cockscomb are regarded as symbols of humor, warmth and silliness. Like roosters, they put on a show. The blooms name comes from its resemblance to a rooster's comb and derives from the Greek word, kelos, meaning burned, burning, or flame like.

This spring, if your urban homestead is aching for some rooster attitude, but you want to stay on your neighbor's good side, plant cockscomb. Use them as a border beside your squash or cucumbers. Sow some to dress up your chicken coop. A fine complement to dahlia and zinnias, cockscomb is low maintenance, disease free, vivid to behold and best of all, you won't hear,
