2:00 to 2:30: Meet and Greet.

2:30 to 3:30: Presentation: Join Larry Everhart March 1st for a brief history and explanation of playing the Diatonic Harmonica, (Blues harp, Tin Sandwich, or Mississippi Saxophone) If you have them, bring a C and G harmonica, and play along with *Oh Suzanna*.

3:30 to 4:00: Snackin' and Yackin' hosted by Tom D and Marilyn H.

4:00 to 5:30: Song Swap Theme: Folktales About Animals.

5:30: Circles and Jams. Instrumental Jam led by Jeff D; Vocal Jam led by Jack E; Native American Flutes led by Sharon H; Guitar Flatpicking with Larry M; and "Thinking Creatively about Chords" led by Kevin T.

New Circle – Guitar Flatpicking

A new circle starts this month focusing on the basics of Bluegrass guitar flatpicking. Larry M will lead this circle to include common rhythms and strumming techniques, picking patterns, licks, runs and other fun stuff. We will be using some familiar traditional songs to practice the techniques.

Vocal Jam

Jack E will lead the Vocal Jam in singing songs of tenacity and persistence from previous movements and generations from the *Rise Up Singing* and *Rise Again* songbooks. Let's join and sing *Lift Up Your Voice and Sing* (famously sung at the Super Bowl) and more such songs!

We use the *Rise Up Singing* and *Rise Again* songbooks. Each book contains about 1,200 songs with lyrics and chords. Bring yours from home or purchase with cash, check or card at the membership desk. The books get packed up soon after the gathering, so best to purchase early. Don't miss out on this limited number of copies for the low price of \$30 each!

Instrumental Jam

The instrumental jam is led by Jeff, as Suzanne is away this month. Just a few "notes" about the instrumental jam: We gather in a circle with our instruments and take turns choosing each song to play together. Many of the songs come from the pink *Ruffwater Fake Book*, available at the check-in table for purchase. Please feel free to request that we play a song slowly a few times first. Looking forward to seeing you there!"

Thinking Creatively with Chords

This circle is designed to provide an easy-to-understand approach to building and creatively using a visual chord reference library. The content is presented in clear examples that can be used by all levels of musicians (beginners to performing professionals). Activities will include playing, discussion of topics, and questions and answers. Some handouts will be provided.

<u>Please Note</u>: Although it would be helpful, you do not need to know how to read music or understand advanced theory. This is a "hands on" learning through playing course.

Main areas of review

- I. Major and Minor chords as families.
- II. Chords as shapes and moving shapes.
- III. Simple chord substitutions to add color to arrangements (small changes, big results).
- IV. Ways to make your own arrangements and original music with chords.

Topics will include (in no specific order):

- Ornamentation (simple chord variations, arpeggios, and strumming ideas).
- Chord fingering options that make playing easier.
- Economy of motion that makes it easier to play through chord changes in a song.
- Easy walk-ups and walk-downs to chords.
- Bar chords and power chords.
- Chording options when accompanying vocalists (soloists or groups).
- Simple chord substitutions and voicing options.
- Looking at instrumental song chording and chord melodies.
- Understanding and using dynamics when playing chords.
- Using chords to enhance songs you already know and play.
- Ideas now how to develop original music.
