Ridin' Drag

The pronouncement is final. The tree is dead. Now it falls on me to remove the remains and restore the lawn to its condition before the pandemic. Before we purchased a trio of Japanese maples in 2017.

The intent was to create a sitting grove. The young acers were set out, watered in, and watched over. We considered benches that would complement their fiery display. We rejoiced when the spring of 2018's buds promised a successful overwintering. Nevertheless, amid multiple projects, finishing off the grove in a proper manner took a back seat.

By the end of May of 2019, we grew concerned. Although the trio carried on, the smallest, planted the furthest west, struggled. Budding became limited. New growth, lacking vigor, failed and required pruning. When annual fertilization spurred the stronger partners on, the nutrients could not help the smaller trees decline. Mid-way through the global health crisis I was encouraged to remedy the situation with a hard prune.

For a brief sixty days I felt help had arrived. Then leaves curled, blanched, and any restoration was aborted with the approach of autumn. With nothing left to prune, last summer could best be described as life support.

After eight years, I will miss mowing around that trunk. But now it is official. Tomorrow, saw and shovel in hand, I will begin the work.
